Over the past several years, CIWA has experienced a tremendous amount of growth and diversity of services offered to our clients. In response to the needs of our clientele, we have focused much of our energy on expanding employment services and employment bridging programs. As a result of these efforts, we are pleased to announce that CIWA has created Employment Services Department. This new department will allow us to continue to focus on the employment and skills training needs of immigrant and refugee women. The Employment Services Department consists of the following programs:

- Bridging the Gap for Foreign Trained Accountants Project
- Links to Success: Skills Enhancement and Internships for Young Immigrant Mothers Project
- Childcare Training for Low Literacy Immigrant Women Project
- Office Administration Program for Immigrant Women
- Employment Skills Program
- Employment Services for Low Literacy Immigrant Women
- Essential Skills Curriculum for Immigrant Women in the Service Industry Project
- Health Literacy Curriculum for Low Literacy Immigrant Women Project

The Employment Services Department will focus on increasing the quality of support to our clients by providing valuable employment and professional skills training, job search support, and opportunities to connect to the Canadian workplace. In addition, the department will strive to strengthen and build new relationships with the corporate community.

Gerda R. Bloemraad, born in Rotterdam, The Netherlands, has been CIWA's President and Board Chair since 2008.

Prior to coming to Canada in 1975, Gerda and her family lived in Thailand, Spain, Greece and England. Gerda's late husband was a geologist; a profession which gave them the opportunity to live in different parts of the world.

After living in Canada for six years, Gerda and her family decided to make Canada their permanent home. Adjusting to life in Canada was difficult. Although Gerda had some knowledge of the English language, she still experienced difficulties communicating with native English speakers. She also had to learn how to navigate through the Canadian school and health care systems, for the most part on her own. Completing day to day tasks, the ones we often take for granted, were harder because of the lack of knowledge and familiarity with her new surroundings.

Over time, Gerda adapted to Canadian society and culture and became actively involved in the communities of Saskatoon and Toronto, where she previously lived. Aside from being CIWA's President and Board Chair, she sits on another board and carries out some contractual work for her previous employer. In her spare time, Gerda enjoys reading, spending time with her family and travelling.

When asked why she became involved with CIWA, Gerda spoke about the experiences she had as an immigrant woman, of her understanding the challenges and obstacles immigrant women face, and her desire to support others in need. Being part of CIWA not only allows Gerda to share her personal experience, but use her expertise as a lawyer too.

When Gerda hears the success stories of clients overcoming seemingly insurmountable barriers with the help and support of CIWA, she is motivated to continue her work.

Calgary Learns – Life of Learning Award

Linda Faulkner was recently awarded Calgary Learns' Life of Learning Award (LOLA) for her exceptional skill, creativity and understanding as a Pebbles in the Sand facilitator. The Pebbles in the Sand Program serves women with multiple barriers to traditional learning. They are typically refugees who have less than seven years of formal education.

Linda is an engaging and energetic instructor who, for the past seven years, has encouraged multi-barriered refugee and immigrant women to be decision-makers in their own educational process. She constantly looks for innovative methods or materials to enhance the learning in her classrooms. She has been known to combine crafts, music, dance, and everyday activities such as cooking into her lessons. She believes that creating learning opportunities based on the participants' interests and needs. Students are empowered to choose topics and themes. These are the successful ways Linda engages her students.

Linda is a natural leader and an exemplary employee. Her dedication truly makes our city a better place to live and learn in.

Everyday CIWA staff work collaboratively with community organizations to ensure immigrant women and their families become contributing members of Canadian society. Staff often find themselves going beyond their regular duties to assist their clients.

Arnida Guillermo, the Filipino Community Development Program Coordinator supports the integration of Filipino families into Canadian society. They experience reunification barriers, cultural differences, parenting issues, social isolation, intergenerational conflicts, etc.

Last month, Arnida, travelled to the Philippines with Annaliza Vergara, a woman terminally ill with ovarian cancer. Annaliza wanted to return to the Philippines and spend her last days surrounded by family, in particular a nine year old daughter she had not seen in two years. Health care professionals from the Foothills Medical Centre, Annaliza's employer, Alberta Health Services volunteer resources, and Arnida worked together to fulfill Annaliza's request. Annaliza arrived in the Philippines on May 17th and passed away on May 31st. Our condolences go out to her family and friends.

Featured Programs

Office Administration Program for Immigrant Women

With the support of Citizenship and Immigration Canada, we are piloting the Office Administration Program for Immigrant Women. The program will help unemployed and underemployed immigrant women with educational and professional experience in administration.

The program will serve the following administration professionals:

- Administrative Assistants
- Receptionists
- Data Administrators
- Health Service Administrators
- Human Resources Professionals
- Payroll Administrators
- Volunteer Coordinators

The program consists of 14 weeks of language, soft skills and technical training followed by a ten week work experience placement. Intakes will take place on July 12, 2010 and January 17, 2011. Participants' daycare costs and travel will be covered. Civic Engagement for Immigrant Women and Youth

Civic Engagement for Immigrant Women has transitioned into a three year funded program. This transition is due to the success the project had in the previous year.

The program retains its original focus of informing immigrant and refugee women about their civic rights and responsibilities in Canada; however, it has broadened its scope and now includes a youth component.

Immigrant women and youth are equipped with tools and strategies that enhance their knowledge of Canadian government systems and procedures. It encourages participants to volunteer in the community and voice their opinions through voting and other civic engagement opportunities.

Through Train the Trainer sessions, women and youth learn the skills necessary to facilitate culturally sensitive workshops. This provides facilitators with an opportunity to become leaders in their community.
