
DAUGHTERS TODAY, LEADERS TOMORROW

The Calgary Bridge Foundation for Youth is a non-profit organization serving immigrant and refugee youth and their families as they build a life in Canada. Since 1990, programs within CBFY have strived to provide newcomer youth and their families with appropriate information, knowledge, and opportunities, holding fast to the vision of developing resilient youth who thrive in vibrant and inclusive communities.

Core values at CBFY include creating a sense of belonging, being ethical and respectful in our pursuit of excellence, strengthening our relevance through collaborative partnerships and positive synergies, championing diversity as our core ethos, nurturing growth and innovative practices and inspiring a culture of excellence.

The Mentorship Program, under the umbrella of CBFY, has been working in collaboration with CIWA to support the settlement and integration of newcomer immigrant and refugee youth entering grades 10-12 throughout the city. Both programs work within high schools to support and facilitate positive transitions for youth into Canadian schools and communities. Not only are referrals made to clients to attend each other's programs, often times staff members facilitate trainings or presentations for one another. In addition, city-wide events play a major role in the collaboration of CIWA and the Mentorship Program. Whether CBFY's Youth Conference or CIWA's Youth Forum, both organizations are sure to attend and refer clients



CIWA's Youth Mentorship Program

Youth Mentorship Program promotes intercultural understanding by providing opportunities to develop support networks and friendships. It also provides leadership development through community presentations and interactive opportunities.

Since its inception in 2011, CIWA's Youth Mentorship Program has effectively graduated girls into the society as leaders in both academic pursuits and extra-curricular feats. The program is available to immigrant girls between the ages of 14 and 24 years. Mentors and mentees plan and engage in activities that support social, personal and academic growth. The ensuing guidance and friendship create a healthy environment for the mentee to successfully integrate in Canada.

Youth Forum is an annual capstone event that highlights the accomplishments of mentors and mentees. It seeks to showcase the beauty in diversity and cross cultural learnings. Youth Forum is also an "all hands on deck" project that also offers youth first-hand leadership experience through stage by stage implementation of vibrant ideas, design and talent display.



Youth Mentorship Program Statistics

Number of countries represented: 13

Number of volunteering hours: 1300+ hours

Participants took part in 8 experiential field trips to venues such as: Heritage Park, Telus Spark, Calgary Zoo, the Calgary Drop-in Centre, Lloyd's RollerBlade, Stanley Park, Winsport, and the Scotiabank Saddledome.

Participants engaged in 9 educational sessions and activities including Color Me Mine ceramic painting workshop, IHeart Radio Westfest Concert, Learning Clicks post-secondary information session, safety tips on attending public events, photography, intergenerational painting activity and Youth Forum planning.

Program mentees delivered 11 presentations at their schools and in the community providing a platform for the youth to engage in public presentations and civic participation.

Participants contributed over 1300 volunteer hours including individual and group support to mentees, administrative assistance, planning and execution of a successful Youth Forum.

Keynote Speaker: Hena Qureshi

The importance of education was always reinforced throughout Hena's upbringing. Hena has currently completed a Master of Science in Health Economics, in addition to her Bachelor's Degree in Biological Sciences and Economics. She is also a certified CPR & First Aid Instructor for Heart and Stroke Canada and the Canadian Red Cross.

Hena's studies have created opportunities for her to further explore international cooperation and community development. She founded the non-profit organization Green Sparrow Care. Her work there has included implementing a CPR and First Aid program, providing education and basic necessities for orphaned girls. She also recently started a new initiate teaching entrepreneurship to elementary students to inspire creativity and innovation. Hena believes that supporting people to take agency over their own situation leads to a sense of empowerment that helps transform their lives and their communities.




Kathy and Coline
